Without question, this leader has been a steady father-figure not only for his two Eagle Scout son's, but for hundreds of scouts during the past 12 years even after his own sons aged-out from the troop.

He is not apprehensive in seeking out the opinions of other leaders and relying on their expertise. He pursues the best course of action that will benefit the boys and the troop. He is well trained, experienced, and an all-around good guy. He was recognized in 2008 with the District Service Award and in 2015 with the District Award of Merit for his unlimited energy and devoted contributions to Scouting.

This leader is keen on communication. He guides, encourages, teaches, coaches, demonstrates tons of patience and accommodates boys with varied skills and abilities. His role takes lots of preparing, organizing, and finding ways for making scouting fun. And he is able to do all this by giving up just one hour of his time each week....at least that's how the saying goes for scoutmasters.

This leader has led Troop 103 to achieve a quality unit rating for the past 12 years (2006-2017). His scouts have achieved top troop status at numerous weekend and weeklong summer camps. Many of his first year scouts, called the Brownsea Patrol at summer camp, have earned the distinction of being to the top honor patrol for their hard work and ability to work and achieving success as a group. This scoutmaster has been part of 24 boys attaining the rank of Eagle.
